SINU successfully hosts 2025 graduation ceremony with a historical 1,173 graduates

The Solomon Islands National University (SINU) on Thursday 11 September successfully hosted the 2025 graduation ceremony under the theme, "Charting New Horizons: Our Stories, Our Future." A total number of 1,173 graduated with certificates, diploma, degrees, and master qualification from the five SINU faculties.

Among the graduates are teachers, nurses, business leaders, engineers, scientists and agricultural specialists who are ready to serve the country.

Graduating with the highest qualification is Mr.Kabini Fa'ari Afia who graduated with a Master of Science by Research.

Solomon Islands National University and Pacific Regional Non-Governmental Organization Sign Memorandum of Understanding

The Solomon Islands National University (SINU) and the Pacific Regional Non–Governmental Organization (PRNGO) today formalized a partnership through the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to strengthen collaboration during the 54th Pacific Islands Forum Leaders Meeting (PIFLM54) in Honiara. The MoU was signed by Dr William Parairato, SINU Acting Vice–Chancellor and Pro Vice–Chancellor Corporate, and Mr. Joey Tau PRNGO representative , marking a significant step in promoting regional dialogue and advocacy on pressing issues affecting Pacific peoples.

Under the agreement, both institutions commit to working together to support civil society engagement, strengthen local leadership, and encourage inclusive participation in discussions around governance, climate change, oceans, and sustainable development.

Speaking at the signing, Dr William highlighted the importance of the partnership, stating that "this MoU reflects SINU's role as a national institution that not only educates but also provides a platform for meaningful dialogue and inclusive participation in regional affairs."

Mr. Joey Tau of PRNGO emphasized that the partnership seeks to create public dialogue on issues facing not only the Pacific region but also the Solomon Islands. "This is about engaging students, academia, and the general public to ensure these spaces are more accessible. We extend our deep appreciation to the Vice-Chancellor and SINU for this support.

We hope this is not a one-off, but the beginning of more partnerships," he said.

Acting vice-Chancellor ot איט, טר william, welcomea the collaboration, noting its value at both national and regional levels.

"This partnership is very important, especially with the upcoming Pacific Islands Forum. The engagement will further encourage local leadership, strengthen long-term relationships, and support governance at the regional level. The University is very pleased to assist," he stated.

This MoU outlines the responsibilities from both parties:

- SINU will provide facilities, promotional support, and academic expertise through lectures, panel participation, and public forums.
- PRNGO will contribute by covering venue and catering costs for selected events, convening diverse CSO perspectives, and ensuring community voices are represented.

Planned Activities during PIFLM54

- Saturday, 6 September CSO Roundtable (closed to CSOs).
- Monday, 8 & Tuesday, 9 September Pacific Peoples Tok panel discussions (open to the public).
- Wednesday, 10 September Public forum sessions.
- Thursday, 11 September CSO Debriefing session (closed session).

The MoU is non-binding and will remain in effect until the conclusion of PIFLM54. Both parties reaffirmed their shared commitment to inclusivity, transparency, and regional cooperation, recognizing the importance of civil society in shaping Pacific futures.

Tell us about your job: My job is to assist the lecturers in delivering the training programs that our department is currently offering to students who are enrolled on our programs. One of the programs is Certificate 4 in Automotive Engineering Heavy Vehicle.

What do you like about SINU and your job? What I like about SINU is that SINU is our nation's own University, and the environment here is conducive for working and learning. My interest in fixing vehicles drives me to become a mechanic. I enjoyed my job, although I work in a male-dominated environment, we work as a team.



When you picture an automotive mechanic or heavy vehicle engineer, you might not immediately imagine a woman—let alone Brenda, who was often the only female in her classes. Female mechanics remain rare in the Solomon Islands: since the 1980s, only eight women have completed automotive engineering training at SICHE, and currently, four are training at SINU. Despite these numbers, female mechanics contribute significantly to the industry, often performing as competently as—and sometimes even outperforming—their male classmates.

Choosing a career in automotive engineering is not a traditional path for women, but Brenda persevered. She became the first female automotive trainer in the country, paving the way for future generations.



As a young girl, Brenda Ratu Titiulu aspired to become an automotive engineer. She was fascinated by machines and vehicles, driven by a curiosity to understand how things work. This early interest led her to pursue a career in automotive engineering.

Brenda is one of the few female qualified heavy vehicle and plant mechanics in the Solomon Islands. She graduated with a Certificate IV in Heavy Vehicle and Plant Mechanics from the Solomon Islands College of Higher Education (SICHE) in 1999. During her training, she gained valuable knowledge, skills, and industrial experience through the program's work attachments. After completing her studies, Brenda worked for Shell SI, which later became South Pacific Oil.

In 2009, Brenda joined the automotive engineering department at SICHE, where she currently serves as an automotive engineering instructor. In her role, she continues to update her knowledge and skills to reflect current industry practices. She recently completed industry attachments with Ela Motor, Motor Corporation, and Hatanga, ensuring her students receive training aligned with the latest professional standards.





Brenda encourages girls in the Solomon Islands to consider careers in automotive engineering or other trades. She advises them to believe in their goals and pursue them with commitment and purpose. For girls choosing automotive engineering, she emphasizes determination, hard work, and persistence to achieve the goal of becoming a qualified automotive engineer.

Brenda's journey is a testament to passion, perseverance, and breaking barriers, inspiring a new generation of female engineers in the Solomon Islands.
